Troutman Planning & Zoning: Rezoning Cases

A rezoning sign is a public notice that indicates a property owner's request to change the zoning class of a particular lot or parcel of land. The process of rezoning involves submitting a rezoning application, which is followed by two meetings, a public meeting before the Planning Board and a public hearing held by the Town Council. In the case of Conditional Rezoning, a community meeting is also held prior to the Planning Board meeting.

The purpose of the public hearing process is to ensure that the proposed uses are appropriate with existing or planned uses on the surrounding property. In addition, decisions are typically made at this point that determine the density (or intensity) of development and its general layout and character. These decisions are made only after listening to any concerns that surrounding property owners or members of the general public may have regarding the proposed

development and its impact on the community.

Important Notice to all Citizens of Troutman

Benfield Sanitation, a locally owned Iredell County family business, has been the exclusive company handling our household trash and recycling services for many decades. A couple of years ago, the company was sold to Danny Lippard. When this transaction occurred, the rate at which we were charged for the services that we had been receiving and were accustomed to was honored and did not change. This year Danny Lippard sold the company to Republic Services, a nationally recognized company in the trash and recycling business.

Town staff recently met with officials from Republic Services. We were informed there would be an immediate price increase in the range of 67% and would continue to increase incrementally upwards in the range of 78% more than what we currently pay. That of course is VERY alarming. As staff, we had heard the rumors of such increases in other areas once Republic Services bought out a local company. We, however, wanted to give the new owners a fact-based opportunity to keep our business and not prematurely react to these rumors.

We also learned in this meeting that many local businesses used cans instead of dumpsters for their normal trash. That practice is against Iredell County Solid Waste rules. Those businesses must be charged a commercial fee for their trash per Teddy Boller, Director, at Iredell County Solid Waste Facility. Mr. Boller had expressed this to Benfield Sanitation previously on several occasions. This trash must be weighed separately as commercial waste per Mr. Boller.

We also learned that Republic Services (and most companies) prefer a one-person truck service. This would prohibit extra bags on occasion from being picked up without a substantial surcharge to the resident. Several business accounts in the area that are already billed directly from Benfield/Republic have received notice that their fees are going up for dumpsters.

Going forward, the Town of Troutman is in the process of (RFI) Request for Information with several companies. After this process is complete, a formal process called (RFP) Request for Proposal will be advertised for any company interested in proposing an agreement with fees identified to do business for the trash and recycling services in contract form. The Town will choose the best company, all factors considered. At this point, it does appear there will be a significant increase in the rates we all pay; to what extent is still to be determined. We will keep you informed of the process as we have the facts.

Troutman Public Works: Sewer System

In efforts to maintain and provide a clean and sustainable community, the Town of Troutman Public Works Department works very hard to prevent sewer spills & backups. One of the biggest issues facing our sewer department is F.O.G.

What is F.O.G., and why does it matter? FOG is an industry term for Fats, Oils, and Grease. It includes animal fats, vegetable fats and oils used to cook and prepare food. FOG is a solid or viscous substance that can create an obstruction in the sewer system if not properly disposed of. When grease is washed down the drain, it sticks to the inside of sewer pipes (both on your property and in the streets). Over time, it builds up and can block an entire pipe. FOG can cause serious damage to the sewer system, your property, and that of your neighbors, as well as damage to streets and waterways from sewage overflows. Also, cleanup can be very costly. How can I prevent F.O.G?

The best way to handle grease and fats is to scrape them off or pour them into containers and dispose of them through the trash disposal. Never put fats or grease down the sink drains or into the toilet.
