Citizen & Organization of the Year Awards

Nomination forms are available at Town Hall– 400 N. Eastway Drive and on our website at www.troutmannc.gov under Forms and Documents. Deadline for nominations for Citizen and Organization of the Year is March 28th, 2025 at 5:00pm.

What is the definition of a Citizen or Organization of the Year?

Citizen of the Year: This award honors those who make a difference in our community through ongoing efforts of residents to improve the quality of life in Troutman. Do you know a friend, family member, neighbor, or business person who deserves recognition for performing a good deed or providing a service that has positively impacted you or others? You can honor them with this award, as it is the Town's way of recognizing residents of the Troutman community who are committed to preserving, maintaining, and improving the quality of life in their neighborhood or community. Troutman Town Council will select the winner from the pool of candidates. Your assistance in honoring these residents is greatly appreciated.

Organization of the Year: This recognition should be presented to an organization that is respected for their commitment, support, services, and activities that promote a positive influence on the community.

Planning Department: What is a Social District?

In 2021, North Carolina passed a law to allow for jurisdictions to create social districts. A social district is a location where people can walk with open, to-go containers of alcoholic beverages in a contiguous area. A social district may include both indoor and outdoor areas of businesses within the defined district during the days and hours established for the social district. Jurisdictions can create social districts by local ordinance approved by the governing body. Each social district must have a clearly defined boundary with signs posted identifying said boundary. The days and hours in which alcoholic beverages may be consumed in the district must be displayed along with the telephone numbers of the ALE Division and the local law enforcement agency. The jurisdiction must have a management and maintenance plan which will address how the district is operated. Since the law was passed, over 60 jurisdictions state-wide have adopted social districts. A business located in the boundary of any adopted social district has the right not to participate.

There has been interest in Troutman to create a social district. Town Council has directed staff to begin the process of researching the positives and negatives a potential social district may bring. A subcommittee made up of both Councilmembers and staff has been created to lead the process. An initial meeting was held on January 13th at Town Hall to hear comments and feedback from local business owners in the area traditionally considered Troutman's downtown. As the process continues, Town Staff will seek feedback from additional business owners and citizens.
